~ Campus Accommodations & Parking ~

When we are able, semester courses are held on the UM@M campus. All buildings and rooms on the UM@M campus are wheelchair accessible. Parking is free at UM@M, but you must have a parking sticker, available in the Student Affairs Office on the second floor in Powers Hall.

~ UM@M Merrill Library Privileges ~

One of the privileges of current paid membership in Sunrise Senior College for permanent and seasonal Maine residents is the use of Merrill Library on the UM@M campus. Your courtesy card allows you to check out items in the Merrill Library collection, and use the URSUS request function for requesting items held in other URSUS libraries. You also have access to the library computers.

To obtain a Merrill Library courtesy card with privileges:

- Report to the library front desk with identification and proof of Maine mailing address (this must be a photo ID Maine driver's license or state ID, passport, or any government issued photo ID. If a mailing address is not on the ID, the applicant must provide proof of residency with a recent utility bill, property tax bill, lease or rental agreement, or motor vehicle registration.).
- Applicants must present proof of current membership in Sunrise Senior College (a receipt for yearly membership or a registration confirmation).
- You will be asked to complete a courtesy card application form whereby you will agree to comply with the rules of the University of Maine at Machias and Merrill Library and to accept financial responsibility for all items borrowed on the card. To renew your Merrill Library courtesy card with privileges:
- Report to the library front desk and present your courtesy card and proof of current membership in Sunrise Senior College (a receipt for yearly membership or a registration confirmation).

Washington County Politics of 1870

with Dr. Jim Oberly

What were the politics of 1870 in Maine? Politics in Washington had entered the Gilded Age and was characterized by scandal and corruption. Did you know that this was the only time in American political history that the US Census asked individual Americans if they were citizens and if they were eligible to vote? Join us and learn how to find information from the Census about individual voters while also finding reports from town clerks from around Washington County to see who were registered and voted in the fall elections that year. The combination of both of these tells us much about the nature of politics in Washington County's towns in 1870.

Instructor: Dr. Jim Oberly is a retired history instructor and seasonal resident of Washington County. His article "Voter Eligibility, Voter Turnout, Partisan Voters, and the 'Big Sort' in 1870 Maine" has been accepted for publication in the journal Maine History and will appear in 2023. The article is based on work done by Jim and his students in a 2021 SSC course.

The Secrets of Edgar A. Poe

Edgar Allan Poe was nothing like what most people think - and neither were his stories! Most of them are comical—and most involve some kind of trickery. Either they tell about tricksters, or they trick readers in some way. The most amazing ones hide astonishing secrets—murder mysteries that were designed to be solved—but until recently were never recognized for what they were.

Susan will lead you into the mysteries that Poe created and invite participants to solve them. We'll begin with a quick survey of Poe's career as a fictionist to get a sense of the nature and variety of his jesting. Next, we'll take a closer look at the many tales that play hide-and-seek with the reader. We'll observe the method—so ingenious yet so simple—that made Poe's secrets so hard to see—but easy once you know where to look. Thus prepared, class members will become the detectives, working to suss out the mysteries hidden in such well-known tales as "The Tell-Tale Heart," "The Black Cat," "The Fall of the House of Usher," and "The Cask of Amontillado."

No prior acquaintance with the work of Poe is needed to enjoy this course. So, if you are a mystery buff, like reading novels or watching and solving mystery dramas on TV, this class is a must for you - so don't miss it!

<u>Please Note:</u> All materials will be made available to every enrolled student free of charge for this class.

Instructor: Susan Amper, Ph.D. is Professor of English at Bronx Community College of the City University of New York and a recognized Poe scholar, who has published widely on Poe's hidden murder mysteries. She has given talks to general audiences, including a TEDx talk, "Poe's Darkest Secret: He Was Kidding," and presentations at the Poe Room in New York City, and she has been a frequent contributor to the Macmillan blog criminalelement.com.

Have you ever been asked to help raise funds for a good cause? Well, here is a chance to learn some important basic tips about this critical skill to make your next project a success. Holding fundraisers in an ever-changing world means needing to think more creatively all the time to get the public's attention. This presentation is designed to help our community learn what to do from the brainstorming phase of a fundraiser to the post-fundraiser review meeting. Rebekah will share tips on how to advertise your event for free and use various free programs to design flyers to distribute. Her goal is to help you gain the confidence needed and discover new tools you can use to make your fundraising ideas come to life!

Presenter: Rebekah Hodgson is the co-director of the Crush Cancer 5k which is held in Jonesboro, Maine. The 5k race has attracted over 500 runners and raised over \$15,000 in 2 years to give back to 2 local non-profits in Eastern Maine. She has helped direct numerous fundraisers including craft fairs, an Easter Basket Festival, and Candyland event for the local Jonesboro Grange #357 to help with the building fund raising over \$25,000. Rebekah works with the older generation in the Jonesboro Grange to bridge the age gap, to make sure their ideas are valued and they feel appreciated for their time dedicated to the organization. She has a passion for community service and knows that our elderly population is one of our greatest assets to learn from.

Recent technological advances in computer mapping have made this once exclusive technology widely available and easy to use. During this class you will learn how to use free online mapping tools and GPS-enabled smartphone apps for a variety of uses. You can bring your own device or use the devices available in UM@M's GIS lab so why not join us and learn how to develop your own mapping tools.

Instructor: Dr. Tora Johnson has taught marine, environmental, and geographic information systems (GIS) at the college level since 1996. She teaches GIS and environmental studies at UM@M and serves as director of the GIS Laboratory and Service Center and as chair of the Environmental and Biological Sciences Division. Dr. Johnson's current human ecological research focuses on community resilience, political conflicts over natural resources and the uses of maps in decision-making. Her work focuses on supporting sustainable and prosperous rural communities in a changing world. Centering on dignity as a guiding principle, she utilizes best practices for resolving conflict and engaging diverse people in productive decision making. In service projects through the UM@M GIS Service Center and the Downeast Health Research Collaborative, Dr. Johnson and her students work with local towns, organizations and businesses to conserve Downeast Maine's natural resources and plan for a prosperous, healthy and sustainable future.

Why are people still fascinated with this 400-year-old play? Why not join playwright John Strand as he gets "under the hood" of Shakespeare's masterpiece "Hamlet." This class will examine how and why the play was constructed and what it is that still drives audiences today to want to see it. In addition to reading the play before class, we will view video excerpts of different productions and discuss the plot, the characters and their motivations, and the impact. This is your chance to see how a great theater piece works – whether you've seen or read this play before or not.

Instructor: John Strand is a nationally recognized, award-winning playwright, author of a dozen published plays, and former playwright in residence, Arena Stage, Washington, DC. He has taught History of European Theater and Creative Writing for New York University's Experimental Theater Wing in Paris and has written on theater for numerous publications, including *Le Monde, International Herald Tribune*, and the *Washington Post*.

Fisheries and Restoration in Downeast Maine

with the Downeast Salmon Federation

Here is your chance to learn about Atlantic Salmon by joining us as we explore environmental restoration approaches specific to the Downeast region taken by the Downeast Salmon Federation (DSF). We will look at over 40 years of great work done by DSF, with a primary focus on current, on-going, and recent projects in the area. Over a four-week period, we will have the opportunity to learn about: conservation hatcheries, wild Atlantic salmon life cycle, fishery and etymology, land trust practices, habitat conservation, habitat restoration, the Endangered Species Act, and how DSF engages the community in interacting with the Downeast environment.

Presenters: Mike Manning (m.manning@mainesalmonrivers.org) joined DSF as their Fisheries Biologist in May of 2022. His graduate work focused on assessing the risk of hybridization between native and introduced salmonids. He combined his fisheries education with his earlier career experiences in the fire service & emergency management to bring a mitigation-focused approach to environmental issues. He will be covering an integrative approach to fisheries issues at the watershed scale.

Mitch Monini (mitch@mainesalmonrivers.org)has a degree in Fisheries and Aquaculture and has 8yrs. of experience of monitoring and rearing salmonids. Mitch has worked in 3 different hatcheries between Idaho and Maine and has worked with all life stages of salmon.

Haley Stein (haley@mainesalmonrivers.org) was a researcher studying fresh water restoration before she switched gears into science communication. She has led outreach and communication efforts with DSF since 2022, and will be covering how important community engagement is in environmental restoration work.

Kirstin Underwood (kirstin@mainesalmonrivers.org) has worked on road-stream crossing restoration and stream habitat enhancement projects across Maine for 5 years as a federal biologist. Kirstin has roots in Downeast Maine and has returned to work with DSF restoring sensitive coastal habitats.

Sara Williams (sara@mainesalmonrivers.org) is the Land Trust Coordinator for DSF and a wildlife biologist by training. She will teach a session about DSF's strategies for enhancing fish conservation through land stewardship and conservation.

How Societies Deal with Crises; Lessons for Global Crises

Crises have been a part of human life throughout our evolution and we have all experienced this on personal and family scales. More recently, national crises have occurred and we now find ourselves in a new era in which crises occur globally, requiring the world to respond at a multi-national scale.

Why not join Dr. Mark Brown as we look at case studies from two of Jared Diamond's books, "Collapse, How Societies Choose to Fail or Succeed" and "Upheaval, How Nations Cope with Crisis and Change." Using information from these texts, we will draw inferences on our ability as individuals, country, and planet to face the impending crises were are seeing today. We will discuss if these case studies provide lessons to help us deal with crises such as pandemics, the risk of nuclear war, and global warming and the climate crisis, as well as others.

Instructor: Dr. Mark Brown has taught numerous classes for Sunrise Senior College on topics diverse as insects, climate change, and history. He conducted research on the ecology of insects in apple and peach orchards and taught classes on biodiversity and ecological economics at Hood College in Maryland.
